Dealing Betrayal

'e wouldn't get out of bed, wouldn't attend lectures. and wouldn't eat. He was sick; at least that's what we, his friends, thought. With a little bit of coercion, he was taken to go see a Doctor and was subsequently admitted. Two days later, he was discharged with an inconclusive diagnosis. Then he confessed; he had been jilted by his girlfriend, someone we all knew. Oops, my friend was heart-broken. He was in shock, had cried secretly, and thought he could not go on without his hitherto sweetheart. He was also angry and felt humiliated but in good time, he learnt to move on

It is always painful when someone you love or loved, trusted and confided in betrays you. These were people you were in relationships with, family members, colleagues at work or just casual friends. We feel let down when a promise is broken, an engagement is called off, a marriage is unjustifiably annulled or dissolved. We feel even more betrayed when a loved one leaves us for someone else, another woman, another man. When what we thought was a secret between two people becomes the talk of town, not to mention the internet and its ability to spread news without bounds. We feel betrayed when in our lowest moments, we expect friends and family to be there and disappointingly, no-show! How about when we're passed over for a promotion or recognition we believed we deserved or had earned at work or in a social organization?

Betrayal involves lying, cheating and of course, broken promises. The feeling of bitterness, abandonment, powerlessness, loneliness, self blame, self pity, low self esteem, fear of the future and denial are among the effects of betrayal. Additionally, one may feel offended, unloved, depressed, paranoid and even mistrust people.

The Healing Process

Dealing with betrayal can be nightmarish but there's hope. In no particular order of significance, the following are steps you may take during the period of healing:

Think: Because you're hurt, there is the tendency to rash with your decisions. Take time to think through what happened, how it happened, the role you played and your next lines of action in order not to worsen the situation. Can the relationship be salvaged; has the other party shown any remorse? You may need more time to ponder over your options in order not to take any actions that may be counterproductive.



Stay calm: Be gentle and compassionate with yourself. Do not blame or hate yourself for what happened. The last thing you should consider doing is hurting yourself physically or in any way thinkable. Confront or not to confront? Having analyzed the entire situation, it may be time to confront your alleged offender. Let them know exactly how you feel in a clear and direct manner. If you are not sure of all the facts of the incident, approach carefully and make known your desire to find out the truth. Be bold; let it all out while also taking care not to escalate the issue.

Grieve: Grieving at this stage is important but you have to grieve for the right reasons. Do you know exactly what happened? Do you know exactly what you're losing or going to miss? Grieving and crying during this period may be uncontrollable and it is perfectly normal but make sure the period does not define you and become a long term event. The earlier you put yourself together and move on, the better.

→ Acceptance: If

someone left you or betrayed your trust in one way or the other, there's a good chance that you may be better off without them. Thank God that you're still here to make a better choice next time! In cases where they have decided to move on, you may be better off accepting their decision and not pursue them. If you fight to get them back into your life or to keep them, you may only be setting yourself up for a bigger disappointment in future.

Take Care of Yourself: Having locked up yourself in your room and cried your eyes out for days, it is time to put on your best behavior, best clothes and step out in style. Take care of yourself by eating well, getting adequate sleep and indulging in activities that you know will cheer you up. Exercising may also help keep your mind off the pain while also keeping your mind and body healthy in such a difficult time.

Get uplifted!: Hanging around people who impact you positively, listening to your favorite preacher or motivational speaker and reading inspirational books may be helpful. Words that encourage, comfort and build you up are what you need to hear at this time. Choose your companions carefully and keep reminding yourself that you will get through it in due time.

Forgive: Being able to forgive is a step towards total healing and emancipation. It is true that the last thing you need is for the offender to get the opportunity to hurt you again but keep an open heart, pray to God to help you to forgive. If you can, pray as well for the other party and watch the power of forgiveness transform you.

Let go: Letting go of your hurts will help to bring closure to this episode in your life. The unforgiveness and bitterness in your heart may even be more draining and agonizing than the pain you suffered at the hands of someone who goes about their life normally, oblivious of what you are going through.

Don't be vengeful: It is important to avoid the temptation to be vindictive towards the other person. Will you really be satisfied if you got back at them, just so they know how it feels? Save your time and energy and focus on your healing as revenging or wishing them evil will do you no good.

Trust again: It is not easy to forget the pain the betrayal may have caused you but you can put your mind to it and learn to put it behind you. Your inability to forget and move on may hinder future relationships. Remember,



just because you were betrayed by one person doesn't mean that everyone cannot be trusted. There are good people out there and you can give someone else a chance.

Seek help: If all the self help measures do not produce a favorable outcome, it may be time to talk to someone else, a person of influence, a professional. Someone who understands how you feel and will be straight and honest with you. A trusted friend, church leader, counselor, therapist or a reputable group may help you to understand that you are not alone as they help you to come to terms with the situation and deal with it.

Move on: Moving on with your life should be your ultimate goal. After a careful reflection on the situation, you may decide to part ways or maintain the present relationship. Moving on mentally helps to bring closure to the painful experience.

Remember that no matter how much you grieve, the other person may never really appreciate your pain or see your point of view. Their assurances and apologies may be taken in good faith but there's no guarantee that what you suffered will never happen again; that no one will ever cheat on you again, betray your confidences or abuse your trust again. LIVE your life knowing that all things work together for good to them that love God (Rom 8:28) and that even if you were to encounter another such situation, you will be better prepared to handle it.

f the beginning of one's life is any indication of how they turn out, then Justice Marful-Sau should be nowhere close to his current position. For someone whose conception was initially denied by the man responsible, for someone whose childhood was filled with work to support himself, his mother and siblings and for someone whose father accepted and took him in later years, only to end up in a worse situation than the working childhood life with his mother, he is indeed a living testimony of The Living God.

Sharing some of the testimonies he has encountered in his life, the current Director of the Judicial Training Institute and an Appeal Court Judge supported his numerous encounters and victories with the Word of God

Hailing from Assin Adubiase in the Central Region, his fondest memory of the power of God was at the initial stage of him being born again. This was several years ago, when his then seven year old daughter became ill and yet the hospitals were unable to diagnose her ailment. After a Full Gospel Meeting he had attended, he felt the need to pray for his daughter. He did and the sickness just disappeared completely. No traces of this mysterious ailment, has since been experienced by his daughter, who is now 27 years old and in her final year at the Law School

He narrated another incident when his wife, Mrs. Eva Marful-Sau got involved in an accident. She was treated and discharged yet after two weeks, her situation got worse. The pain and discomfort grew to the point where she could not walk. He believed Jesus to heal her so when his aunt and husband persuaded them to seek prayers from a "powerful" woman of God, they reluctantly agreed after a series of persuasions. The prayer meeting was finally arranged but on the day, on their arrival, she refused to see them as arranged. They returned home perplexed amidst confusion and the unexplained reason why she has refused to see them. In time, his mother in law passed away and at her funeral at Accra Ridge Church, his wife had to be assisted (practically carried), to the podium to read a tribute for her mother. On another occasion, at the same Accra Ridge Church, Reverend Lyanne Koffi was having a one week program of revival.

On the first day, he attended with Eva, however on the second day of attendance, he left earlier to attend a Full Gospel Fellowship Meeting. He was later informed of the wonderful news that miraculously, his wife had been healed. He believed that The Lord had presented his wife in her weak and poor state to a congregation at Accra Ridge Church, and to the same congregation on another occasion, The Lord caused her to be healed. The sequence of events revealed to Justice Marful-Sau the demonstration of God's power and confirmation that He listens to our prayers.

At The Lord's appointed time, He makes all things beautiful. Justice Marful-Sau was one of two Judges who was selected in 2007 to read a postgraduate programme in Petroleum Law at the University of Dundee, just at the time when Ghana discovered oil. In 2002, he was appointed a High Court Judge. In 2004, the first Commercial Court in West Africa was commissioned in a new facility built by Danida (a Danish Aid Agency). The then Chief Justice appointed six ludges to manage this facility. Out of the six, lustice Marful-Sau was appointed President. Before this appointment, he was presiding in Koforidua. In 2006, he was appointed an Appeal Court Judge and in the same year appointed Director of the Judicial Training Institute in 2011. With all these progressive successes and unparalleled strides of achievement, would you believe that right after his University Education, his Uncle secured a school in the United States for him to read his masters yet his visa application was refused?

Would you believe that while in Form three at Breman Asikuma secondary school, his father left the country without notice abandoning him without any financial support and no idea how he was going to secure help to complete school vet before the following school term, he had been awarded a full

scholarship? "The power of God is always at work" muted Justice Marful-Sau with a broad smile.

On one New Year's Day, he went to visit some relatives and as he was being served a drink, the drinking glass cracked into fragments. He was very surprised, so he took the bottle, prayed over it and drank the remaining content from the containing bottle. He sought explanation from friends with some science background who told him that it is possible for liquids of certain temperatures to crack glass of another temperature, but the puzzle was that, if that was the case, how come the bottle did not break? He prayed fervently about it and The Lord revealed to Him later that He did not want him to drink from that glass because it had been defiled. Indeed, The Lord takes care of His own!

The word and power of God have been the same as from creation. He that keeps us has not slumbered. He is near unto all who call upon Him in truth. He demonstrates His love for us in so many ways. He

> has been, is, and will be the only constant, for while all others have changed, he has remained unfazed. Trust In The Lord with all your heart and He will lift you up. If Daniel, Paul, Moses, David and Solomon are too far away for you, if the miracles performed and narrated in the Bible are far reaching, and have you thinking that it may never happen to

you, here you are with a living testimony, he is living amongst us today, and he has just shared a few of his testimonies with us.



Teenagers & Peer Pressure

hetherit's the latest and hippest dance, "Azonto" or the latest fashion styles, every teenager wants to "fit in" in one way or the other. Like the proficient marketing professionals some will grow to become, they understand that image is everything and they care about what others think about them. They want to be accepted by their peers hence, the desire to hang out with the cool and popular guys in school and in the community they live.

As a teenager, I came up with all kinds of excuses including "losing" and "accidentally" breaking a pair or so of my glasses (spectacles) when I wanted to upgrade to a trendier one. You probably remember the amount of time you spent looking at yourself in the mirror prior to an important outing or date, making sure your clothes were right, the shoes matched whatever they

were supposed to match, hair in good shape, and you were well coordinated with borrowed accessories from big sister, big brother and even friends just to be hip. Or, do you remember when you sneaked into mum or dad's closet and "borrowed" a pair of shoes for that special occasion with your friends? And when they found out? Well, you just didn't want to stand out in a bad way, you wanted to impress, you wanted to be accepted, you wanted to fit in!

Most teenagers are influenced positively and or negatively by the people around them particularly, their peers. This is peer pressure and it comes in the most subtle form to the most blatantly applied pressure. Negative peer pressure may lead your teenagers to experiment with drugs, alcohol and other dangerous substances, shoplifting and other misdemeanors, hooliganism, truancy, premarital sex to mention a few. These 'adventurous' behaviors lead to trouble with parents, school authorities and ultimately, the law, potentially destroying and wasting young lives.

When friends influence your teen to do good things such as encouraging them to do public speaking, take up leadership roles, learn and achieve academic goals, and even to say no to illegal and immoral acts, that is positive peer pressure.

What Every Parent Should Know – Some Peer Pressure Facts

Now, if you thought peer pressure among teens is nothing to worry about, here are some startling facts most of which can be attributed to peer and other environmental influences:

- 90% of teenagers in a survey admitted to have been influenced by peer pressure. (Parent Further)
- 28% agreed that their social standing improved among their friends when they gave in to peer pressure. (Parent Further)
- About 30% of teens are offered drugs in middle and high school. (Adoloscent Substance Abuse Knowledge Base)
- 74.3% of high school students have tried alcohol. (National Housing Survey on Drug Use and Health, US Dept of Health and Human Services)
- 70% of teenagers who smoke have friends who smoke or started smoking due to peer pressure. (Canadian Lung Association)
- 50% of teenagers feel pressure from their friends to have sex. (Kaiser Family Foundation)
- 49% of teens experience a pregnancy every year. (Communities Responding to the Challenge of Adolescent Pregnancy Prevention)
- 44% of teenagers drive better without friends in the car (Allstate Insurance Company)
- Bullying and harassment by peers is one of the top reasons why teenagers harm themselves (Sheffield Information Giving Network). Others entertain suicidal thoughts as a result of bullying by peers (Yale School of Medicine)

How to Combat Teenage Peer Pressure

It is clear that many teenagers feel pressured to indulge in self destructive behaviors such as smoking, alcoholism and pre-marital sex which may impact them both physically and emotionally. The feeling of guilt that follows in most cases can even be more troubling. Teenagers need to develop self confidence and a good sense of independence in order to withstand peer pressure. Here's what you can do as a parent.

1. Keep the Communication Lines Open:

Growing up, it was a taboo to talk back to one's parents and other adults. Most teenagers feel inhibited to share their desires, fears and other adolescent concerns with their parents. As a parent or adult in a position of authority, you ought to be approachable and be willing to listen to your teenager without being judgmental. Talking must not only be limited to when there is the need to reprimand or give instructions. You must be prepared to talk about other subjects especially those your teenager is interested in including, fashion trends, sports, popular TV programs and latest high-tech gadgets. Once you have a good rapport with your teenager, it will be much easier to discuss and caution them about the dangers posed by substance abuse, premarital sex and other negative peer influences.

2. Set Clear Boundaries and Expectations:

Your teenager must know what behaviors are acceptable and which ones are not at any point in time. They must also be made to understand what the consequences of their actions would be including, relevant disciplinary actions at home, the impact on their future and even potential encounter with the law. Set the rules about their responsibility to report their whereabouts and who they are with at specific times as may be necessary.

3. Know their friends:

"Show me your friend and I will show you your character". This is a common Ghanaian adage every teenager should know. As a teenager, the only friends my parents didn't know were the ones most likely to influence me negatively. These were friends you didn't invite home knowing very well that your parents will not approve of them. Parents must know who their teenagers' friends are and possibly who their parents are, where they live and even what the parents do for a living. Encourage your children to bring their friends home so that you can keep an eye on them as well as know exactly who and what your child is playing with.

4. Spend time with your teenager:

It is said that children spell love, T-I-M-E. Spending quality and uninterrupted time with your teenagers will help create the bond necessary to open the lines of communication, trust and positive peer pressure. There must be mutual respect and trust between adult and teenager in order to foment a frank and honest relationship. Remember, even though your child is likely to spend more time with their friends than they do with you, you are the first line of defense against negative peer pressure.

5. Be prepared to compromise:

Some teenagers become prey to negative peer pressure in their quest to rebel as a result of unresolved conflicts at home and elsewhere. While parents may need to be firm on a variety of issues, they must be prepared to compromise on issues of less importance. In other words, pick your battles. Areas of compromise may include your teenager's choice of clothes, colour on their bedroom walls, decorations in their rooms and their choice of music especially if they continue to excel in their education.

When you notice a sudden change in your child particularly, when they start being overly secretive, sudden change in friends, sudden change in clothes, sources of which may be unknown to you, disinterest in school, sudden attitudinal change and unusually rebellious, your teenager may be succumbing to negative influences by peers. This may lead to



experimentation with drugs, alcohol, sex and other deviant adolescent behaviors. Do not panic. Pray for your child and ask God for wisdom and direction. If you haven't been talking to your child, it is time to engage them in order to find out just what may be going on in their lives

Whatever you do, remember, your teenager may well be going through exactly what you experienced as a teenager and there may be no cause for alarm. Even though your child may be about to cause fear and panic in your house, there is no need to employ all the covert Bureau of National Investigations (BNI) and Criminal Investigations Department's (CID) investigative methods to get answers as this may only worsen the situation and further alienate your teenager. It is important your teenager knows that you love them and that your actions emanate out of love and in their best interest. Let them know that God loves them too and He has better plans for their future!

his is the story of a head porter, popularly reffered to in Ghanaian language as "Kayayoo", now a Member of Parliament (MP) in Ghana, her name is Gifty Klenam Kekeli Agbemava. Her father hails from Anlo in the Volta Region and her mother from the Eastern Region of Ghana. She was born and spent part of her early life in the Eastern Region. Now ian Honorable member of the Ghanaian Parliament, she represents the Lower West Akim Constituenty on the New Patriotic Party Ticket. Honorable Gifty Klenam, as she is called by all and sundry is one very beautiful woman on the surface and a one with a super strong will within.

The Honorable Minister is the fourth child of her parents until her Engineer father decided to marry another woman from his home Region. He left this nucleus family of five children alone with their head teacher mother and didn't look back for a very long time. In those times, teachers were not exactly renumerated well in Ghana so her mother travelled to Nigeria to seek a better life to enable her support the children better. She left the children in the care of their bed ridden grandmother in Kyebi Amankrom. Gifty was eight years by then and from that moment, the transition from a well catered for child, to one who had to cater for herself set in. School seized to be an option. Survival was her main worry. She started going to the forest with a friend, Akua Ataa, to look for mushrooms,



snails and anything she could sell while her other siblings also struggled for their survival. At age ten, she had started carting heavy logs of wood from the forest to the roadside in order to earn some money for food.

One day, she went to the school she had been enrolled in but was not attending. She just happened to pass through the school in her tattered clothing, just to check what was going on. Fate may have smiled on her that day because her father showed up at the school and ordered her and her younger brother to get into his car. She protested but her father succeeded in getting them into the car. Seated in the car was one of their half brothers, well dressed and obviously being chauffeured to boarding school by their father. He drove them to Ho, where the half brother was attending school and took Gifty and her brother to Tema, where they were to be catered for by their aunt, their father's sister. Ironically, this was the same sister who got an Ewe wife for their father. Once in Tema, the children's dream of a better life was never lived. Instead of school, this aunt made ten year old Gifty work in her local restaurant, popularly called "Chop Bar" which was at the Tema Main Harbor. She also worked as a "Kayayoo" (Female Porter) during this period. Every day for three years, young Gifty walked to her new place of work from their Tema Community

One Residence. She was not taken care of, even food to eat, despite where she worked was a struggle. She always had to steal food for her younger brother and herself

After two years of living with her aunt and three more years of working as a "kayayoo" in order to support herself and her brother, the aunt's fiancée confronted her aunt concerning the status of the children and

their schools. This man took it upon himself and enrolled the children at Datus Complex Schools. At age fifteen, Gifty was admitted to stage five. She later used savings from her "kayayoo" business to pay for extra tuition. In a year's time, one of her other brothers came to visit from the Village and she used her "kayayoo"

money to register for the common entrance exam through her brother in another town. When it was time for the exam, she left to Asamankese with one "olonka" (Measuring Cup)of gari, palm oil and enough money for her transport to the village. She sat for the exam and came out as the second best in the whole school. She gained a government scholarship and enrolled at Assoum Secondary School where she wrote her O'Levels. She found her way to Accra and sat for her A' Level exam. Just around the same time she conceived her first son.

Gifty however promised herself while in Secondary School Form three that she will never work for anyone in her life. She started her now successful fruit juice company, Sun Harvest Ltd with her small kitchen blender. Eventually, she got a loan facility which helped her to expand the business. With hard work, diligence and a

desire to be successful, Klenam is now a happy woman whose happiness is "Rayayoo" money again to register for the common consolidated when she sees salvation being preached to people. 



lim Rohn in his book "Seven Strategies for Wealth and Happiness" said, "Give a million dollars to someone who does not possess the attitude of a millionaire and that person will most likely lose it. But take away all the wealth from

a true millionaire and in no time he or she will build a new fortune. This is because those who earn their millionaire status develop the skills, knowledge, and experience to replicate the process again and again". Do you possess the attitude of a millionaire? Get this straight; money alone does not make one rich. People win thousands of Ghana Cedis through lottery and in no time find themselves paupers again.

In the effort to achieve economic growth and development, one of the major challenges facing individuals, families, and most developing countries including Ghana, is illiteracy. One form of illiteracy that plagues not only the uneducated but also the

> educated is financial illiteracy. Financial literacy is one's ability to understand and deal effectively with basic economic and financial issues that confront individuals from day-to-day.

Financial Literacy means having the broad-based knowledge, skills and the ability to read, understand as well as undertake basic financial activities such as money management, investing in treasury bills, bonds, shares, collective investment schemes and other instruments on the financial markets.

Did you know that:

- Most of the things we buy and call assets are really liabilities?
- You do not always need money to make money?
- You could send your money to work for you?
- You could have very good academic results and have a good job but become financially poor?
- Your wealth is limited to the financial knowledge vou have?

Information available to you determines how you think and how you think determines how you behave. Again, how you behave determines what you become. Appropriate information will help you change how you think, and this new thinking will determine how you will handle money. How you will handle money can make you either rich or poor.

Robert T. Kiyosaki and Sharon L. Lechter in their book Rich Dad. Poor Dad -What the Rich Teach Their Kids about Money That the Poor and Middle Class Do Not, said "Money is one form of power. But what is more powerful is financial education. Money comes and money goes, but if you have the education about how money works, you gain power over it and can begin building wealth".

It is important to understand the fact that more money does not necessarily make one rich, if you are not financially literate and you are given more money, your problem will only be compounded. Becoming financially literate will help you to address questions such as:

- 1 How can I invest when my salary is already insufficient for my needs?
- 2 If I have GH¢1,000 how should I invest it?
- Does it take money to make money?
- How can I maximize my returns and minimize my risks?
- 5 I have bought some shares but the prices have started to decline, should I sell them?
- I have the option of receiving GH¢10,000 at the beginning of the year or GH¢12,000 at the end of the year. Which option do I choose?
- I have paid GH¢10,000 into my account. I am not sure when I would need the money in my account. What do I do with the money?
- 8 I need some household goods, should I take a bank loan to buy them?
- 9 Should I apply for the loans available at my office when I do not really need the money?
- 10 Should I buy my first house with a mortgage or not?
- 11) My investment is providing me returns below the inflation rate, what should I do?
- 12 My investment is providing me returns below the Treasury bill rate, what should I do?

Becoming financially literate does not mean that one does not need the advice of professionals like fund managers, investment advisors, brokers, lawyers, and accountants. Rather, the more financially literate you become, the better you learn to use these professionals. Some of the basics of financial literacy include the ability to understand the time value of money, financial independence, and the effects of inflation on our daily lives among others. Let me use this opportunity to introduce you to the concept of the time value of money.

A cardinal principle of investment is that "a (Ghana) cedi today is worth more than a (Ghana) cedi tomorrow." If given the choice between receiving the GH¢10 at the beginning of the year and the same amount at the end of the year, most people will prefer to receive the money at the beginning of the year. The reason being that, one can do more with the GH¢10 at the beginning of the

year than at the end of the year. That is, the value of money changes with time. This is the concept of the time value of money. So what has the concept of time value of money got to do with financial success? Whenever you have money you will not use immediately, you must put it in an investment that can yield some returns else you would be losing out. Most people are not aware that there are investments for various periods of time – 7, 14, 28 days and in some cases overnight.

Whenever you enter into a financial transaction and have the option of receiving payment either immediately or at a later time, remember "a cedi today is worth more than a cedi tomorrow." I remember a conversation I

had with a painter who has just completed a job for a client. The contract stipulated that 50% of the amount should be paid upfront and the other 50% at the end of the contract. Due to some delays on the part of the client, it took the painter three years to complete the job before he received his final payment. What the painter did not know was that the amount he charged three years earlier did not have the same value as the amount paid to him at the end of the third year (time value of money).

Whenever you have money you will not use immediately, you must put it in an investment that can yield some returns else you would be losing out.

It is a noble thing to pay debts on schedule, but, whenever it is possible to negotiate an extension without additional interest, please do so because it affords you time to earn returns on the money. On the other hand, whenever you have to receive payment from other people, it is financially prudent to negotiate early payment due to the concept of the time value of money.

"If a man empties his purse into his head, no man can take it away from him. An investment in knowledge always pays the best interest".

What is the way forward?

You have to become a student of the subject of money management and wealth creation. Note that the subject of money management and wealth creation is not taught in regular schools in Ghana. If you do not have books on the subject, get some books and study them. You have to be willing to pay for the cost of financial literacy. You can also enrol in short term financial literacy courses as well as attend seminars on wealth creation and financial independence.

Benjamin Franklin puts it this way:

"If a man empties his purse into his head, no man can take it away from him. An investment in knowledge always pays the best interest".

Becoming financially literate will cost you money, you can be sure that the benefits will far outweigh the cost. The Bible even puts it better "Wisdom is supreme; therefore get wisdom. Though it cost all you have, get understanding" (Proverbs 4:7).


If you think education is expensive, try ignorance.

Romance Employment Regulations

here is a factual principle of life which validates the belief that when you put adults in an enclosed space, they are bound to relate sexually at a point in time. This fact of life has been proven even in the event of putting only single sexes in an enclosed space such as conditions that pertain in prisons.

Many of us spend an average of 10 hours in the workplace each day and sometimes even weekends. The workplace passes as a conducive and enclosed space that has the potential of breeding sexual activity. The tendency to keep sexual issues hush hush is very high especially in our cultural dispensation. But where issues of sex especially in the workplace are becoming a plague and robbing organizations of productive time, wrecking marriages and dismembering our communities, then it is essential and unavoidable to talk about it. Romantic relationships in the workplace may generally be classified in terms of the parties involved in the relationship and especially their positions in the organization.

Types of Romantic Relationships in the workplace

The first type of romantic relationship you are bound to find in a workplace is one between the owner of the business or the boss and an employee. Some female owners of businesses also engage in romantic relationships with their male employees. This type of relationship always has a stubborn repercussion for indiscipline in the workplace. The second type is a romantic relationship involving two managers or supervisors. In this case, the problem is not insubordination but reduced concentration on the job, little or no supervision of subordinates, and a reduced quality of work. The third type is a romantic relationship between a Manager/Supervisor and an employee. This I believe is the most common you may find in the workplace. This also breeds a lot of contempt against the employee within the work team or department because the employee involved may all of a sudden begin to act



as if they are superior to their contemporaries. They may become insolent and disrespectful towards other managers or colleagues in the workplace because of the relationship with the manager.

Finally, workplace romance may take place between two employees. I must admit that even though it has the tendency to affect the work of the individual employees involved, adverse effects of this type of romantic relationship is not as high as that of managers/supervisors and employees but do have same devastating effect. Employees in romantic relationships in the workplace have a lot of time on their hands when unsupervised and do all they want to do such as send emails, talk to each other on the phone, chat on the internet, write love notes, letters and poems to each other, meet each other in the washroom and other private places to do all the amorous and sexually illicit things unimaginable.

Employment Regulations on Workplace Romance...

So what are the regulations that guide sexual activity in the workplace? There are no specific regulations on romance in the workplace. The Labour Act, 2003 (Act 651) is specifically silent on workplace romance but generally addresses it through a provision for the "protection of interest" of the other party in an employment relationship. The Labour law also has provisions on sexual harassment. However, sexual behaviour is only harassment if such behaviour is without consent and unwelcome to the

party. In workplace romance, mutual consent is actually the beginning and cannot constitute sexual harassment. Hence, sexual activity is often regulated through individual company policies. While some organizations do not condone such activity, they fail to regulate it. Other organizations however strictly prohibit any form or romantic relationship in the workplace.

Regulations or policies for effectively dealing with office romance and sexual relationships do not and must not seek to take away the rights of employees or anyone for that matter to fall in love in the workplace. Such policies and regulations must seek to inform employees that all employee activities of a romantic or sexual nature that evidently have adverse effect on their work performance and hence productivity cannot be tolerated in the organization. It must also clearly state that such acts if proven can lead to specific sanctions against the perpetrators. To effectively enforce such policies, core values and codes of discipline of the organization must clearly prohibit activities of a sexual and romantic nature between all employees and management staff within the company.

A business is a profit making venture. Anything other than that is unwelcome to the interest of the business and hence the organization. Romance or sexual relationships do not and are not aimed at satisfying the interest of the organization but individual interests. This is a conflict of interest and must be treated as such. By all means, employees may fall in love. But please and please, they have to keep all romance, romantic, and sexual activity outside the four walls of the offices and workplaces. That can lead to gargantuan disciplinary troubles.



ow many times has the story been told of how an individual gave financial assistance to someone who did not pay back? Or how people default on their payments for goods and services? Most likely, you can relate to this situation yourself, because someone refused to pay what he or she owed you.

What should have turned out to be a favour or perhaps a gesture of goodwill could result in financial loss and further lead to feelings of betrayal, breach of trust or eventually the loss of a previously good relationship.

We often tend to adopt an informal approach to our transactions with family and friends. Surprisingly, this is also where we can be let down.

It is advisable to enter into formal, written contracts in our ordinary transactions, particularly in instances where the value of the money, asset, services or goods involved is significant. There are numerous benefits of entering into formal contracts in such circumstances.

Formal contracts can save relationships. For instance, when you're working with a friend, and problems arise concerning the work, both persons can refer to the contract to appreciate their respective rights and obligations and this can help resolve such problems.

What is a Contract?

A contract can be defined as a legally binding exchange of promises between two or more parties (persons, entities or bodies) that the law will enforce.

A contract may be created in any of the following ways:

- · Orally;
- In writing;
- By inference or conduct; or
- By a combination of all or any of the above

Key essentials of a Contract

This article will not deal exhaustively with the essentials of a contract but will guide you to clearly understand why you need to have a contract in place for one reason or the other.

In order to have a binding contract, there must be an offer by one party which should be communicated and an acceptance of the said offer by the other party. The contract must be supported by consideration which is the value or benefit accruing to one party which he/she is willing to give away for some other valuable or beneficial

thing or act or property. The parties involved must intend to create legal relations by entering into the contract. This means that they should from inception understand that their rights can be enforced by the courts. It is important to note that the courts will not enforce domestic or social arrangements which the parties entered into with no intention of creating any binding legal obligations. Consider a situation where your uncle is in the habit of giving you a sum

of money monthly, and fails to give you this sum in a particular month, you are likely to fail in bringing an action to demand payment from your uncle. The courts will view these payments as a domestic arrangement which was not intended to create any binding obligation. This requirement should be borne in mind especially when entering into contracts with friends and family.

You are advised to ensure that the terms of the contract are certain in order for it to be enforceable. Where the terms are vague it creates problems with enforceability. In a contract for cleaning services it is advisable to state among others the specific areas to be cleaned, the number of times in a week the service is to be provided, quality of cleaning materials to be used.

It is important that the persons entering into a contract have the capacity to do so, for example a contracting party should be a person of sound mind and should have attained the age of maturity. There are some instances where contracts can be entered into with a minor who has a guardian acting on his behalf. The issue of capacity often poses problems in contracts. There have been instances where persons have rented properties from someone claiming to be the owner when indeed the person is simply a caretaker with no authority to rent the property. It is important to insist on reading documents that establish a person's ownership of an asset or their authority to deal with the property. Having read these documents there may be the need

> to verify the information before signing the contract.

In conclusion always remember that you can minimise damage to your relationships by taking the time to agree and set out in writing the terms and conditions governing transactions between you and your friends and family members. To ensure that the law protects you, it is important to seek legal advice where you are not conversant with the law regarding the transaction you are undertaking. It is advisable to secure the services of a lawyer to draft the contract. People often complain about the cost of legal fees. It should be noted that you protect your interest and save money in the long run by engaging the services of a professional.

Always remember, a contract does not mean I don't trust you, it's only a way of safeguarding the interest of the two parties and more especially to ensure that we don't take each other for granted. %-







alm, collected and with a seemingly shy disposition, Actor and Theater Facilitator, Adjetey Anang is a married man who worships at the International Central Gospel Church where he is one of the Youth Facilitators. Growing up in Tema, through Baptist Church School, SOS School and then to Labone Senior High School for his secondary education, he describes his growing up period as fun and full of happiness. He grew up in a neighborhood he prefers to call diverse as it comprised of people of various classes, color and caliber in there. He has a sister and is the only son of his parents.

Adjetey, who is quite passionate about applied drama, emphasized the point that drama and film making should not always be about making money and commercializing. He admonished producers and other stakeholders to produce pieces that will seek to educate and change behaviours.

In a meeting with Truelife magazine, he gave his straight and honest answers to the following questions.

TM: (Truelife Magazine): What got you into acting?

AA: (Adjetey Anan): It was by chance. Mere coincidence. I accompanied my friend, Wakefield Akuoku to a rehearsal at GBC a long time ago. As fate would have it, one of the actors did not show up. The Director asked that I take the script and read those parts to aid in the rehearsal. He was impressed with my delivery. He asked if I had ever done anything close to acting. I said no and he said I would be a good actor. The next time,

I accompanied Wakefield again and well, one opportunity led to the other and here I am today, by grace. The television series, "Things We Do For Love", however propelled me, though I had been acting before then.

TM: Can you share two of your main challenges with us and what motivates you?

AA: At a point, the roles became boring because it was almost the same thing. Some producers or directors seemed to be comfortable with me playing certain roles only and that came with its own associated boredom. Another is the fact that I stick to my principles of not wanting to play certain acts, mainly sexual roles. Sometimes other people do not respect that. They think that once other actors are doing it, I must do it as well. On the issue of motivation, I believe I can impact the lives of other people through acting. Besides, I want to leave a mark in the industry, a mark of discipline with humility, so yes, that motivates me to keep going.

TM: What is your take on prayer and success? Do you think they are intertwined?

AA: Very much so. Often I hear people complain that prayer does not work or that they have prayed for one thing for so long. What I think is that prayer must be backed with a lot of faith. I love praying. I pray constantly and indeed, most things we gain in this life is as a result of prayer. I prayed about further schooling. I was a bit taken aback on how much it was going to cost me yet I received a full scholarship to study in Johannesburg, South Africa. Prayer helps. Prayer saves. Prayer propels.





TM: What are some of the practical things you do to show God's love?

AA: I help people as much as I can, especially when I get the chance to be invited to talk to others. I appreciate such moments because I get to share my story, my mistakes, my pain and successes. In one way or the other, such occasions definitely will impact on someone. Besides that I am a Youth Facilitator at Church.

TM: Which one moment can pass for your happiest?

AA: It has to be two! That is when Elom, my wife, agreed to marry me. The day she agreed to marry me and the moment I got to know about the full scholarship for my Masters program.

TM: Is there any mystery you would want God to solve for you?

AA: Well, The Word says in Heaven, it will always be praises and worship. I would like to ask God if I will get the chance to spend some time with my wife in Heaven.

TM: What is your favorite Bible verse?

AA: That is 1 Thessalonians 5: 16 – 18.

Gaining admission to the University of Ghana to read Drama and Radio and Television for his first degree, he has become more humble with his successes. Her work required her to have the minimum linguistic and cultural skills to effectively connect with consumers from diverse backgrounds and socioeconomic groups.

Elikem soon found that the most dynamic and connected consumers were the children she interacted with in her pet entrepreneurial project – babysitting. A big fan and lover of children, she explains why she found this role much more rewarding. The ability to soothe a child's worries with just 5 minutes of undivided attention, reach out with a helping hand to a parent juggling many tasks and a career, provide a solution for a family needing support with a child or two is all bundled into the mission of Playpen 24/7.

Elikem quit her regular job at The Coca-Cola Company to focus on this dream entrepreneurial venture. The confidence to move from boardrooms to backyards, spending time holding sticky baby fingers can only be an act of grace and a leap of faith. This native born Ga called Elikem smiles and explains that her name is a unique asset that people find unusual in a society where names are meant to quickly identify your background.

Elikem Asenath Obiorkor Commey **(EAC)** was engaged in a chat by Trulife Magazine **(TM)** and here are excerpts from the conversation.

TM: What has been your major challenge since you started working on your own, full time?

EAC: Ability to pre-finance our services. It was immediately critical that we have access to funds to allow us provide first class offers that appeal to parents through their wards. Once we gain the child's confidence (believe me the children have to endorse us), word of mouth does the rest of the work and you can breathe easier

TM: How have you been able to solve, or minimize this challenge and what keeps you motivated to keep on?

EAC: I ensure that I have a transparent system of billing that keeps the parents informed about rates upfront, once the fees are agreed I have a backup plan for cash flow to put the services in motion. Don't be deceived though there is nothing like a rosy start. You have to be willing to have nothing in your pocket and sacrifice many small comforts and luxuries to make a lasting impact. It's important to know that every day is an open door to walk through. There are days I felt I would faint but by the time I got on then off my knees from prayer, the next morning looked very bright and possible.

What keeps me motivated?

It's always simply refreshing when I meet a child's need, especially the need for their own space. That is the concept behind the layout of my backyard where we have ample space for kids to run around.



TM: Does prayer play any role in your life and the path you've chosen?

EAC: Prayer has a lot to do with everything. Prayer is the one thing you don't want to make excuses about. The common one is "I can't make the time". Your success, triumph, happiness and peace are all hinged on your ability to say a word of prayer in your heart or silently on your lips every moment of the day. Skip lunch sometimes and sit quietly in your car or at your desk in the office and pray – it just changes perspective from my little experience.

TM: What has been your greatest achievement?

EAC: Your question makes me reflect on why Apostle Paul was not hasty about what he had done but said he counted all things foolishness for the sake of the gospel. You know what? The only time you should measure a great accomplishment is when you know you've truly served your generation through Christ. Till then nothing qualifies yet.

TM: What practical things do you do to show God's love?

EAC: (Amidst laughter) I love to offer lifts to people in my car. That is my favorite thing and it always fills me with joy especially because the ladies always look at you with surprise when you stop for them to sit. Take it from me; it's the easiest way to find people to witness to about Christ- use it.

TM: Is there anything you would want to ask God, if you are given the opportunity?

EAC: I would ask him why He gave us the opportunity to have our own will. It still baffles me. We tend to have the knack for simply going the other way when the right way is in front of us!

TM: Would you say you are more humble?

EAC: I would say yes, growing up in the knowledge of God is making me more humble daily. I understand now that EVERYTHING including the ability to even love is a gift from God.

On the point of whether Christianity is boring, she became very emotional and emphasized that those persons who do not know their commission in Christ are the only ones who think that Christianity is boring. She challenges Christians to follow their calling and

What motivated you to adopt?

I grew up in a home of 15 kids and only 5 of us were my parent's kids. The rest were either relatives or kids that my parents had brought home from the village to take care of. My parent's love for kids has been a motivation to also do same. How do you manage with the four kids?

The older girl is able to attend school on her own on public transport, and I have a driver who runs the pick ups for the rest of them. As they are sufficiently matured they are able to comport themselves at home after school before I return from work.

How does your Daughter feel about it?

She is only 3 years old. She looks up them as her siblings.

Elsie Concluded: I believe that anyone who can afford to take care of less privileged children should grab the opportunity and do so. Especially families believing God for the fruit of the womb, if you take care of others, God will take care of you. I believe that it may not be the portion of everyone to have kids and if we cannot have our own then we should take care of others. Even families with children can add other kids to their families. If this was to be the case then you can imagine the number of smiles we would put on the faces of numerous children orphaned and poverty stricken. There is such fulfillment in doing this and I know that God will reward abundantly anyone who takes care of his own.

He admonished that ... \



They will not quit. The afflicted will forever try to teach grandmothers how to eat eggs. [The saying is "how to suck an egg". But we don't do that. We eat, not suck eggs.]

he general issue here is the positive impact which our culture and received traditions can make on health and wellness. [In *sankofa*, we have rich pickings]. Breast feeding is the specific case in point.

The evidence is clear. Pretenders from the west *had* got it wrong. Decades later, they see their folly. Today, they turn around, and, declare: "Here, let us teach you a thing or two about the health benefits of breast feeding."

They blush not, neither will they hush up. How can they? Afflicted as they are with the Promethean curse. ['Prometheus' is a character from Greek mythology. The chap was punished by the gods for stealing fire to give to humans. Courtesy: Prof Kofi Awoonor.]

Breast Feeding On Front Pages

About three weeks ago, this headline hit the air waves: "Breastfeeding Time magazine cover divides opinion". [Source: BBC, 11 May 2012.] The cover of the magazine in question showed a mother breastfeeding her son. [The woman was from California. The boy was three years old.] That article is the trigger for this.

The writer continued: "While the publishers and breastfeeding organizations have backed it, it has provoked an angry reaction."

You too would have seen the photo? It was daring. Joanna Moorhead from the 'Guardian' says the real issue is this. Mothers are stopping breastfeeding too early."

We Got It Right

As for breast feeding, our received tradition has got it spot on! Let us review some of the booklong ways of looking at the health issues involved.

"Children who are breastfed for four months or more develop *fewer* behaviour problems, Oxford researchers say". The study, involving 10,000 mothers and their kids, says that it may be because of the make-up of breast milk. Or, breastfeeding may lead to better mother-baby interaction.

Health Benefits For Babies

Breastfeeding is associated with health benefits for babies. That we know. Five examples are allergies, asthma and diabetes, as well as infection and obesity. The infections are in the ear, lungs and gut. These are the sort which give running tummy, running nose and running ears.

Breastfeeding lowers the risk of obesity in childhood and in later life. However, one fact must be added. Obesity is a saga. The controversy continues.

Serious Study

Known as the Millenium Cohort Study, it roped in over 10,000 mothers. They were asked to assess problems in their kids by the age of five. Behaviour problems included anxiety, clinginess and restlessness, as well as telling lies or stealing.

Only 6% of kids who were breastfed misbehaved. That number contrasted with 16% of kids who ate formula stuff. The Researchers concluded: "Our results provide more evidence for the benefits of breastfeeding."

BREASTFEEDING TOO EARLY."

Breast Milk, Or, Mom's Smile?

Researchers went looking for explanations. What is the source of the goodies associated with breast feeding? Is it breast milk as such? Mom's touch, perhaps? Or, both?

"Breast milk contained fatty acids, as well as growth factors and hormones". These were important for the development of the brain and nervous system. That is one side of the coin.

The other side is this. Moms who breastfeed tend to interact with their kids more. This could mean that, in turn, their kids learn more about acceptable ways to behave."

Hitching A Ride

The advantages extend to moms, too. They are allowed to hitch a ride with, or sail in the slip stream of the breastfeeding boat. The benefits are truly striking.

First, moms who breastfeed lose the weight they gained in pregnancy *faster*. Secondly, they have a lower risk of pre-menopausal breast cancer.

More Good News For Mom

Moms who breastfeed lower their own risk of three common killers: heart attack, heart disease and stroke. If you breastfed for more than a year, you are 10% less likely to develop the conditions than women who never breastfed. Even breastfeeding for at least a month may cut the risk of diabetes, high blood pressure and high cholesterol.

Nor is that all. Research has found that breastfeeding reduces a woman's risk of osteoporosis (brittle bones) in later life, as well as two cancers: ovary and breast.

Data Source & Numbers

The study, by the University of Pittsburgh, focused on some 140,000 post-menopausal women. The beneficial impact lasts for decades. As well as cutting the risk of heart problems, breastfeeding for more than a year cut the risk of high blood pressure by 12%, and diabetes and high cholesterol by around 20%.

What We Are, And, Are Not Doing

In response to these research findings, one officer said: "We must not send a negative message to mothers that they have failed, or, make them feel guilty because they bottle-fed their babies."

To make moms' feel guilty about breast feeding is one thing these columns are certainly NOT doing. Instead, we are returning to our roots. We seek the good that lies embed in them. And, we've found that, with breast feeding, we can feel justly proud of sankofa.

The Bottom Line

"Breastfeeding is an important part of the way women's bodies recover from pregnancy. When this process is interrupted, women are more likely to have a number of health problems, including heart attacks and strokes."

And here comes the bottom line: "The longer a mother nurses her baby, the better for both of them."

For centuries, our received traditions have preached and practiced exactly that. Sankofa! Need more be said?

rocrastination manifests itself in every aspect of your life. You wait until the last minute to buy birthday or Christmas presents. You put off seeing the dentist, or getting that pain or condition checked out by the doctor. You forget to register to vote. You need to get you car oil change. There is a pile of dishes getting higher in the kitchen. Shouldn't you wash clothes now so you don't have to waste a Sunday cleaning everything you own?

You keep saying "I'll get around to it", "I'll start tomorrow". "I'll start next year", "There's a growing list of books I'll read one day". The list gets longer!

Before you do though, you begin to think, maybe you should check your email, check your Facebook too, just to get it out of the way. The excuses keep coming

You keep promising yourself this will be the year you do all these things. You know your life would improve if you would just buckle down and put forth the effort.

Procrastination is when things are put off and not done. Procrastination is when you put off things that you should be focusing on right now, usually in favour of doing something that is more enjoyable or that you're more comfortable doing.

Other definitions, suggest procrastination occurs when there's "a temporal gap between intended behaviour and enacted behaviour." That is, procrastination is occurring when there's a significant time period between when people intend to do a job, and when they actually do it.

In psychology, procrastination refers to the act of replacing high-priority actions with tasks of lower priority, or doing something from which one derives enjoyment, and thus putting off important tasks to a later time. Procrastination may result in *stress*, a sense of *guilt* and *crisis*, severe loss of *personal* productivity, as well as social disapproval for not meeting responsibilities or commitments. These feelings combined may promote further procrastination. While it is regarded as *normal* for people to procrastinate to some degree, it becomes a problem when it impedes normal functioning. It is believed that chronic procrastination may be a sign of an underlying *psychological disorder*.

There is a misconception that people procrastinate because they are lazy and can't manage time well. But research has revealed that in truth procrastination is fuelled by weakness in the face of impulse and a failure to think about thinking.

There is something about your own behavior you should have noticed by now, something which keeps getting between you and the things you want to accomplish.

The slips become more frequent, but you keep saying you'll get around to it. You'll start again on Monday, which becomes a week from Monday and then the next and so on. Your will, succumbs to a death by a thousand cuts. By the time the end of the year is out, it looks like you already know what your resolution will be the next year.


To have a good chance of overcoming procrastination, you need to spot straight away that you're doing it. Then, you need to identify why you're procrastinating and take appropriate steps to overcome the block.

Remember that the longer you can do without procrastinating, the greater your chances of breaking this destructive habit for good!

Procrastination is such a pervasive element of the human experience. It is a problem everyone admits to, so why is it so hard to defeat?





Is this just a cultural thing that is frowned on or it is Biblically wrong to wear anklets?

Joyce: I think biblically speaking as in 1 Tim. 2:9 says: "I also want women to dress modestly with decency and propriety, not with braided hair or gold or pearls or expensive clothes." Modesty is the word. We must not cause anyone to stumble. Christianity is about forgoing our rights so that others will grow and see Christ in us clearly, just as Phil. 3:1-10 says.

I really want to go to heaven but try as I do I am unable to live the perfect life. What really are the criteria to go to heaven?

Joyce: The Bible says in Colossians 2:6-7 that "So then, Just as you received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to live in Him, rooted and built up in Him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and over flowing with thankfulness." "I am the vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing" – John 15:5. We have to depend on the Holy Spirit to help us to live to please the Lord as we read in John 14:21 & 23 as well as Phil.2:13. Jesus calls us to remain in Him because in Him we have a new life – 2 Cor. 517 & 21.





My wife refuses to have sex with me and for the past three months I am sexually starved. I am tempted to satisfy this desire with someone else. How do I deal with this?

Joyce: In 1 Cor.7:1-5 The Husband and wife belong to each other and in this case she should not starve you. Find out from her why she is doing that and resolve the issue. Satisfying your sexual urges with someone else is a sin. She could be going through some issues which she is afraid to share with you. Do some soul searching – you could have hurt her so deeply that she is finding it difficult to have sex with you.



Must I have a church wedding to be considered as rightfully married as a Christian? Is Church wedding biblical? I would really like to know the basic rule of getting married and how?

Joyce: In Gen. 24 we see Abraham seeking a wife for Isaac and Gen. 29 gives us an example of how Jacob married. It should be with the consent of the bride's parents and since we live in a country and also belong to a fellowship, we must marry by the agreed methods. Jesus attended a wedding ceremony in a home and not a synagogue. A church wedding in itself does not constitute a Christian marriage but those who do it with the right motives do so as a witness of their faith in God.



We have been dating for 2 years and just started planning our wedding two months ago and my girlfriend told me that she is barren. I don't mind the fact that she is barren but I have lost my trust in her because she took so long to tell me. I don't know if the relationship is going to be the same. I am confused, kindly advise!

Joyce: Your fiancée took so long because she did not know how you would take it. Loving you as she does, it must have been a struggle for her. Please understand her and if you truly love her you would put it behind you. What about if she had not told you at all? The late Mackeown of the Church of Pentecost, Madam Theresa and many other people did not have biological children on their own but had many adopted children. Love must be your watchword. Many have delinquent children which makes them wish they had not given birth.

rom being called the Asare sisters, the annals of gospel music in Ghana cannot be written without the name of the vintage gospel music group, Daughters of Glorious Jesus. Arguably the all time best gospel group the country has witnessed. The trio, Cynthia Appiedu, Edna Owusu Sarpong and Monica Owusu Ansah make up this group. Blessed with the gift of singing, the trio started singing at an early stage of their lives in Santaase, Kumasi. Cynthia and Edna are siblings. The two however met Monica in the same choir at Resurrection Power and Living Bread International Church under the mentorship, guidance and tutelage of Rev. Akwasi Asare Bediako who was the then assistant to the founder Rev. Amoako of blessed memory.

To help nurture their musical talent and Christian life, the trio lived with Rev. Asare Bediako an arrangement



Truelife story of God working through an ordinary man who believed in Him and endured the hardships of life.

orn in the early sixties to fante parents in Fante New Town, a suburb of Kumasi in the Ashanti Region, Mr William Orhin, is a certified Chartered Accountant and Business Executive and a family man, married to Mrs Millie Orhin, a trained Child Evangelist with whom he has six children, one of whom is adopted. Both William and Millie are members of the Full Gospel Business Men's Fellowship International.

As with many children growing up, William had dreams of his adulthood. He dreamt he would be a Doctor or an Engineer but circumstances with his upbringing saw him venturing into accountancy and rising to great heights in that profession.

Right after his sixth form education, William found himself working as an Accounts Clerk at the United African Company (UAC), now known as Unilever Ghana Limited. He had studied Science subject during his secondary school education, but he found



himself excelling in all the in-house training programmes and courses at the time. One of his colleagues advised him to consider pursuing a course in accounting following his keen interest in the subject area.

At the time, life was really difficult, as he had lost his father, the only breadwinner of the family. His meagre income had to support his mother and the rest of his siblings. This notwithstanding he still managed to save some money to enable him pursue an accounting course with the Institute of Chartered Accountants, Ghana. During these very trying times, transportation costs were totally out of the question for him. He would walk from Mamprobi to Accra Central, then to Accra Polytechnic and back home to Mamprobi, a journey of some 15 miles.

Willie Orhin has had a lot of challenges in his life. He has had close encounters with death and has had some very trying times but finding Christ and growing in strength by reading the Scriptures has helped him tremendously. "I was frustrated having lost out on a number of scholarship opportunities to study abroad, yet I found reason to keep my head up high and kept going."







While still a child, he was pronounced dead on arrival at a hospital after an unidentified driver knocked him down. As he was being prepared for autopsy, one nurse saw him moving his finger and asked that the Doctor examine him again. Alas he was alive but after two weeks at the hospital, he was reported missing. As to how he was found still remains a mystery, he has still not been able to understand the circumstance.

At age twelve, when he started boarding school, his father asked a senior student to be his guardian. Unknown to his father, this senior student was hooked on drugs. He could have easily been introduced to drugs but for the intercession of some Scripture Union member friends who realised his apparent exposure and danger, and prayed to save him from such a life.

During his secondary school education, the young William one day took a trip to the beach, together with some of his colleagues. He did not know how to swim and was being taught by one of his friends. The unfortunate happened when they were swept away by heavy waves they could not fight. William was lucky to have been rescued but his friend was not found. He had drowned!

Although he always dreamed of a better and brighter life, life remained difficult for a long time. He wanted a new employment as his current one at the UAC did not pay enough to support himself and his younger siblings. During this period, he started attending one of his friend's church. This friend always brought food items home and this was the main attraction for William to go to that church. After a while, the items were not forthcoming.

All this while William, was not paying attention to the sermons, but when he started, he realised that, the church was using different books and doctrines aside the Bible. They did not even believe in the Holy Bible at all. Six months later, he decided to quit particularly after a two-month period of no food hand outs.

William realised he had been fed with a doctrine so different from the teachings of the Bible. This he adds made him very argumentative. William joined another church. He recalls, one morning, while arguing with Reverend Tetteh Djangbah, he said in a gentle but authoritative voice that "William, you will end up in hell if you die without surrendering your life to Jesus". This statement killed his argumentative self as he started imagining pictures of hell as he had been taught at Sunday School. Eventually, he started reading and studying the scriptures on his own and praying a lot more. He later left that church as well

William, who now works at the Ghana Civil Aviation Authority loves to smile. He is always smiling, so much that one can hardly notice his anger, should he ever get angry. He intimated that when he got a job at the Ghana Civil Aviation Authority, one of his very first bosses told him that due to the pressures of the position, he will suffer from one of two predicaments: he will suffer hypertension and get grey hair much earlier than nature had planned. William told himself that he will not suffer from any, so he decided that no matter what the situation, he will find strength to overcome any circumstance and smile rather than get angry. William added that, "People do annoy me sometimes but I still choose to smile and when eventually their anger subsides and they question in awe why I did not get angry, I seize the opportunity to minister to them."

On advice to the youth, William said it is very important for the youth to plan their lives and to adopt role models. The role models should be someone very admirable yet close enough to be able to give advice and counsel once they reach crossroads. He added that aside all these; it is very imperative to get closer to God.







By incorporating both stories from her life and stories from the Bible, Osteen Comes demonstrates that faith requires perseverance and delivers overall uplifting and motivating words of wisdom.

You Are Made for More includes a section for note --taking and reflection, and in closing, Osteen Comes writes that God "doesn't want you to give up. He wants you to taste the sweetness of His promise -- to bite, not into thin air, but into your destiny, to swallow it and live it, to feed off him forever."

SONNIE BADU'S COVENANT

hen I met Sonnie Badu for the first time my first words were, "I have been looking for you!". That is so true because Truelife was looking to share the life of Sonnie Agyeman Badu (I bet you didn't know his full name) with its readers, and as fate will have it we met with him and he obliged to share his story with us.

Just as I expected, he had a very busy schedule but I admired the fact that he was polite, courteous and willing to make time for Truelife. It was almost impossible to find the right time so we had to have his interview over breakfast on the last day of his visit to Accra, en route to the UK. Even though I inconvenienced him, he warmly welcomed me. Thanks to me, he only had very little to eat and we left the table with his omelette untouched! Sorry Sonnie!

Sonnie Badu was born in the UK to Ghanaian Parents, Juliana Agyeman Prempeh and Rev Agyeman Prempeh, former employees of the then National Airline of Ghana, "Ghana Airways". His dad is now a full time Reverend Minister and his mum owns and runs Blue Sky Travel Agency. Sonnie began his education at Alsyd Academy, (The great Alsyd Academy, as he put it!) and then to Ghana Secondary Technical School (GSTS). As Sonnie recalled memories of his childhood his eyes sparkled and he was so expressive you could feel the emotions of the moments he recalled as follows:

I was very active in school; I was a Cadet Officer, entertainment prefect, footballer etc. I was a very popular guy in school, and everyone knew me for all the bad reasons. The prefect who punished you for all sort of things including praying! I was part of every juvenile vice that happened in school but was never caught. I was a very good dancer and singer at entertainment events in school. Together with some of my friends we composed some songs which we sang and till date some of our school mates still remember the tunes. I also remember how I would lie to my mum that I was sick and needed money, she would rush to the school and when they were looking for me I would be out of school doing one thing or the other. This annoyed my mum a lot. But she always fell for the trick! Despite being a naughty boy, I was loved by all the teachers in school because my mum was very nice and kind to them".

Family Values

Sonnie noted that his dad was very strict and brought them up with strong Christian values, which he is grateful to have experienced. He adds that, at the time some of the experiences did not appear great but today they have formed the foundation of his life. "Daddy did not accept lateness for Church" he recalls. "As soon as daddy entered the car he was moving and you must be in church, else.... Whenever we were late for church, we would run into the car with our socks, shoes and a comb just so we get in the car before he did!"





The Process

Sonnie mentioned that after the turning point, came the process of transition. During this transition his mischief did not just disappear, they gradually faded away with time. For a period of time he continued to hang out with his old friends like going out to their usual hangouts, his friends however noticed a difference and started asking guestions. Sonnie was no longer the life of the party. He did not participate, but sat back and watched everyone. He mentioned that his life began to change and he started attending Scripture Union (SU) meetings. The junior students became worried and scared because they thought he was there to ridicule them! (I couldn't help but laugh. Wow! Sonnie must have been really terrible to attract such a reaction). In summary Sonnie said it took sometime to completely depart from his old ways. He then went on to say; "Today my life is a testimony to my friends of what God can do to a man. One of my friends, Pogasty, who was my PIC (Partner in Crime) is still my PIC (Partner in Christ)!"

I asked Sonnie how his ministry in music started and he recounts:

After secondary School I moved to the UK and was living with my sister. I was working at Boots Pharmacy and played the role of a drummer in church. My Pastor at the time, whose name I would like to withhold asked me to quit my job and work for the church fulltime. I decided to do full time ministry wholeheartedly with no salary, provided my rent was paid. This promise was not fulfilled, to my disappointment. During this difficult period my personal belongings comprised of a suit that I wore to every program for two years. My shoes had holes in them and in the winter I would feel so cold. There were countless times when I had no money even for food and had to beg church members and friends so I could have something to eat or travel from one place to the other. I saw all this as part of my transition and remained steadfast in my belief that all would be well. I turned my struggles and hardships into creating a success story, and with regards to the suit, I still have the jacket to date. Every now and then I wear it as a reminder of how far God has brought me.





Things began to take a positive turn in my life when I met Daniel Korsah, he became a mentor that God used to mould my life in a positive way. It was during this period with Daniel Korsah that God gave me the inspiration to write the song "Baba". Daniel told me I was not ready to record the song. I listened and waited patiently for the right time. Whiles waiting for the right time we made so much money through several businesses we jointly owned. I had enough money to build a custom made house in London which I named Soni's Court. However, we lost everything due to mismanagement and immaturity. We went our separate ways and I had to find my feet again!

I then met Kwame Yeboah who helped me finish the song Baba. This was a huge challenge because I had no money to pay for Kwame's services but he offered to help me out. There were times I didn't eat so I could save to pay some of my bills. When I didn't have money to catch the bus or buy fuel I would resort to walking to the studio. Due to Kwame's quest for perfection I had to record the song Baba over fifty (50) times. To the Glory of God the song became a blessing to many and still is.

I have been in Ministry for 15 years but it is in the last four years that God's hand picked me. I believe everything I went through was preparation for his time. For every person to be truly successful you have to survive the journey through the wilderness.

I am still amazed at what God is doing with me. Recently I performed at the Wembley Arena for the global day of prayer. I am humbled to say that I am the first Black African to minister on that platform. To the glory of God I have shared stages with renowned artists such as Phil Driscoll, Alvin slaughter, Wanita Bynum and many more.

Songs from Sonnie Badu's latest album Colors of Africa was played at the funeral service for the former president of Ghana, John Evans Attah Mills.

Sonnie has already started work on his next album entitled "When Worshippers gather"

Sonnie Badu is a teacher as well as a preacher and holds conferences and seminars in various places and venues. He mentioned that his conferences were one of the moments when he feels real fulfilment. Christianity is so much fun, and when people see tangible manifestation of Gods power, then people will give credibility to Christianity.

Talking to Sonnie Badu was so easy; he had no airs around him, which is unusual of most successful and famous people.

I asked Sonnie why he made things so easy?

He said: "When Jesus heard that people were being prevented from seeing him, he told the disciples to let them come to him. Humility is paramount and will take you far, it's Gods requirement, when you humble yourself he lifts you up."

Yes I asked the Million Dollar Question, Are you married?

"I am not married yet but making plans to tie the knot soon"! So now we know he is taken!

Sonnie concluded his interview saying, "I have not started yet, God was just preparing me and now is my time to take off. My Mission is to keep divinity and humanity together. People must be able to play our songs in their moments of trouble and feel the power of God work through them. It's a promise that even when we are not there our songs will keep people going".

What is the best way to remove my body hairs including pubic hair? Shaving Stick, Blade or hair remover?

How much time, money and effort do you have to devote to getting rid of unwanted body hair? Having smooth, hair-free skin doesn't always mean pain or high cost. The simplest involves the use of special preparation depilatory (hair removing) creams, which are available over the counter and will generally be effective for two to four weeks. This is straightforward and relatively cheap, being performed in the privacy of your own home.

The other is laser treatment, involving three or four treatments spaced several weeks apart. This can be expensive and is not a permanent way to remove hair, but produces a good long lasting result for most patients.

Sugaring (the use of a sugar paste) and waxing (using hot wax and strips of cotton material), which remove the hair by the roots and last for four to six weeks, are two of the most efficient and popular methods of hair removal for facial, abdominal and chest hair.

These techniques can be rather uncomfortable depending on the sensitivity of the area being treated and the experience and technique of the practitioner.

Over a period of time, these methods can lead to a weakening of the hair growth, resulting in thinner and finer hairs.



Plucking may be the best method for the relatively sparse hairs around the nipple area.

Electrolysis is not a permanent way of removing hair, because regrowth is possible. It is reported to be effective and long lasting, but is considered by some to be too painful for areas other than the face and chin.




Dreams are not carved in stone; they change and evolve with time. As we grow we acquire new tastes, society changes and so we must align our dreams to these changes.
